TRAFFIC CALMING AND ROAD SAFETY

In 2011 the Parish Council conducted a survey distributed to all residents to ask their opinion of Seer Green as a place to live. Ninety per cent of those who took part voiced serious concerns about inconsiderate parking and excessive vehicle speeds through the village. In response, a number of measures were introduced to try to resolve these issues. Unfortunately, to this day, despite the installation of Vehicle Activated Signs and three newly created footpaths to help children get to school safely away from the main road, the issues of speeding and parking remain the focus of major dissatisfaction to residents, evidenced by the fact they are regularly raised at Parish Council Meetings by members of the public, at meetings attended by parents and staff at the school and in individual letters addressed to the Parish Council.

Towards the end of 2014 a letter was sent to County Councillor, Tim Butcher, requesting his help to try to resolve or certainly improve the current situation and his response has been supportive. The Parish Council has now submitted a request for Local Priorities Funding to Bucks County Council, which forms the basis of the 'Seer Green Traffic Calming and Road Safety Project' for the following three schemes.

 Double yellow lines starting just past the Jolly Cricketers Pub on Chalfont Road and ending near the bus stop outside the Old Baptist Chapel. Rationale; to stop parking on the

- bend which causes an extremely dangerous situation by forcing vehicles passing those parked onto the wrong side of the road into the path of oncoming traffic on a blind bend.
- The installation of 'build outs' (pinch points) at either end of the village, i.e., School Lane and Chalfont Road respectively. Rationale; to slow traffic down on the straight, residential sections when entering the village to the legal 30mph limit.
- The painting of 'formalised' zig zags with a Traffic Regulation Order to stop parking on School Lane on the side opposite to the school starting just after Seer Mead and ending just after the school entrance. Rationale; to stop double parking which obstructs the passage of large vehicles such as the bus, fire engine, etc. The double parking also represents a safety issue with children crossing the road between these parked vehicles with passing motorists having to look both sides at once whilst concentrating on negotiating the narrowed road.

A decision will not be reached until December 2015 which is why we are carrying out a survey whether residents feel speeding and inappropriate parking are issues that need to be addressed as a matter of urgency so that we can forward the results to BCC to add weight to our demands. In the meantime, SLOW signs will be repainted on the road surface to remind motorists to SLOW DOWN!

GREEN MEADOW PATH



The new path has now been installed across Green Meadow from the Stable Lane corner to the gate that leads down to the school in order to provide a safer route to school and to relieve some of the congestion on the pavement. We were grateful to receive significant funding from the Local Area Forum and the Living Streets charity for this project. The Parish Council has been delighted by the positive response to the path and has received a significant number of messages of appreciation from parents, grandparents and the school.

In May I was elected Chairman of Seer Green Parish Council; a pretty formidable challenge to step into the shoes of the previous Chairman, Cllr Dennis Scourfield whose drive and commitment in the role secured many improvements and facilities for the village during his tenure of 4 years. County Council to the Parish Council, the footpath across Green Meadow and the erection of a War Memorial and improvements to the Cemetery entrance to mention but a few.

Whilst continuing to support further improvements to facilities and services in our community, I am actively involved in working to secure grant funding for play equipment suitable for children aged 7+ not catered for currently.

Also, having lived in Seer Green for 28 years and witnessed the increasing volume of traffic using the main road through the village, I am keen to try to get measures implemented to reduce speeding and inappropriate parking as outlined in the article on the front page.

In conclusion I feel very privileged to live in such a pleasant place where both my sons were born and grew up, and any suggestions from its residents as to how to both maintain and improve the village and its facilities will always be welcomed.

SEER GREEN NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

A Neighbourhood Plan is a way of helping local communities to influence the planning of the area in which they live and work. It can be used to develop a shared vision for the village, to seek views from villagers on those things they would like to preserve/influence, for example protecting green spaces, the appearance of the village, the appearance of buildings and on future development. The Parish Council Working Party have now contacted more than 30 organisations and institutions in the village with basic information about the Neighbourhood Plan proposal. We have also made a formal application to the Chiltern District Council (CDC) for an "Application for Designation of a Neighbourhood Area". This application seeks to define the geographical area to be included in the Plan. CDC has been consulting on the designation with all interested parties and

members of the public and a copy of the application and map is included on the Parish Council website.

We continue to gather information about the village as a prelude to writing a description for inclusion in the Plan document. Thought is being given to holding a village meeting at which a number of speakers would provide an overview of the Neighbourhood Plan process and answer questions. The process follows a number of stages - identifying the issues, developing a vision and objectives, generating options, drafting the Plan, consultation and submission, an independent examination and a referendum and adoption. We then hope to form a Neighbourhood Planning Group of 8 to ten villagers to take the project forward. If you wish to be involved please contact the Parish Clerk.

These are the judges' comments for Seer Green:- "Seer Green has a beautifully and intelligently maintained churchyard, with patches of large daisies between closely mown areas. There is a well-tended and litter-free Recreation Ground. The pavilion was in use as a Montessori school when we visited – a good example of multiple use. Green Wood and Long Grove Wood are great assets to the village. We had a very pleasant walk through both. All meeting halls appeared in good condition with little or no litter. The notice boards reflected community activity. Areas around the shop and two pubs were tidy and litter free, with both pubs having a welcoming appearance. Good overall appearance, with evidence that residents like their village and take pride in it. The grassy areas in Farmers Way were particularly well managed."

A new defibrillator has been placed for public access in a secured box on the front wall of Jubilee Hall. The unit is easy to use and is designed for safe use by a non-medical person. On ringing for an



ambulance, if a defibrillator is deemed necessary, the opening code for the box will be provided.

SEER GREEN & JORDANS WI

Seer Green and Jordans Women's Institute celebrated their 90th Anniversary this year with a wonderful display of over 200 hand crocheted cherries which were displayed on the cherry tree outside the Parish Church Hall. The cherries gave a very effective display and all the children were fascinated by the fruit that grew overnight!
