SPEEDING AND ROAD SAFETY

Seer Green Parish Council requested Bucks County Council to carry out a speed survey during January and February to provide data to inform future discussions on the speeding problem in the village. The measurement point was in Chalfont Road opposite the entrance to The Coppice – around 80 metres from the School entrance.



Over a 2 week period, the results were as follows:

- 60% of traffic was <31 mph
- 90% of traffic was <36 mph

The data however shows that on weekdays, traffic speeds around school arrival and departure times were significantly lower with 96% of speeds less than 36mph.

However, the Parish Council is still concerned that 10% of motorists are still driving at over 36mph and 40% are still driving above the speed limit near the school. This is still not acceptable so please monitor the speed of your car in the village as it is all too easy for you not to realise that you are actually driving in excess of 30mph. Over recent years Police speed checks have concluded that the majority of people speeding actually live in the village.

The Parish Council will continue to consider what further practical steps can be taken and have contacted the Police about speed reinforcement.

In our last magazine edition we informed you that the Parish Council were looking into double yellow lines in the village. So far the formal consultation to residents and businesses in roads directly affected has taken place. The responses have been reviewed and subsequently Transport for Bucks are going forward with the plans for Chalfont Road, Church Road and Hearnes Meadow but have revised the layout of the yellow lines at Howard Road and Howard Crescent. The officer decision report will be available once reviewed by the Director of Transport for Bucks County Council (BCC). Once this decision has been made it will be published on the BCC website and consultees will be notified.

We expect work to commence shortly after this.

COUNCIL TAX PRECEPT

It is that time of year when we all receive our Council Tax Bills. In order to work for the village the Parish Council raises funding through the Precept, i.e. that small part of the Council Tax that goes directly to the Parish Council, which this year is £45,000. Within a small village you may wonder how that money is spent. All our assets must be maintained, repaired, replaced and kept safe for public use, including Green Meadow, Jubilee Walk, Green Wood, the allotments, Recreation Ground, Pavilion, streetlights and cemetery. In recent years Bucks CC have devolved a number of areas to our responsibility, including roadside maintenance, grass cutting in 30mph areas, hedges, rights of way clearance, clearing the edges of pavements, weed killing and the maintenance of street furniture. As you can imagine these additional costs mean that we are facing some significant increases in our costs that have put pressure on our Precept charges. Whilst we try to keep any increase to a minimum the Council Tax contribution to the Parish Council has increased by 2% this year.

Is Seer Green the Best Kept Village?

Only two weeks to go until the judging starts for this year's Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village Competition. There are five categories depending on the size of each village and the Parish Council have entered Seer Green for the DeFraine Cup (for villages with a population size of 1500-3000). Judging takes place between 1st June and 7th July.

Seer Green last won the competition in 2013 and last year we were runners up scoring 94 points out of a possible 100.

The main areas judged are:

- * Cemetery, graveyard
- * Common, green, playing field (Recreation Ground)
- * Children's play area (Green Meadow)
- * Nature conservation areas (Green Wood, Long Grove Wood)
- * Village halls, community centre, church hall
- * General environmental features

Other features that are taken into account are: The areas around shops and pubs, bus shelters, notice boards, war memorial and overall appearance, lack of litter and evidence of community effort.

The whole village will be judged, not just the specific features listed above; the community will also be assessed as seen by the judges on the inspection day.

Councillor Norbury gives a suggestion of how we can help. "How about every time you go for a walk, no

matter how far, you remember to take a carrier bag with you, as when shopping, and pick up any litter you may find. It is amazing how quickly it fills.

Seer Green Village were runners up in 2016, and I believe that if the residents of Seer Green unite in a 'KEEP SEER GREEN TIDY' campaign we will win the competition."



Community spirit is important, so please keep your front gardens tidy and even the pavements in front of your homes if you can! Seer Green Parish Council have a programme of tasks to ensure the village is looking its best in June for the competition, and if anyone feels they are able to spare some time please contact the Parish Clerk Liz Bates.

Seer Green's Cherry Trees

In the 19th and early 20th century there were vast cherry orchards at the centre of Seer Green, which gave Orchard Road its name, and people came from all over the County to see the glorious blossom. Much of the produce was shipped to Covent Garden by cart, followed later by railway. The fruit was also used by locals to make pies and Seer Green became known as the 'Cherry Pie Village'.





In celebration of this historical association, six new 'Prunus Sargentii' cherry trees have been planted at various sites in the village; a copse of three at the Chalfont Road entrance to the village, one at the Bayne Hill entrance, one on the corner of Hearne's Meadow and one in Green Meadow, with a further tree to be planted at the Bottom Lane entrance, subject to approval by National Grid whose gas supply occupies this verge.

We hope you will enjoy our new additions.

FAREWELL TO COUNCILLOR SCOURFIELD

At the end of March we said goodbye to Councillor Dennis Scourfield as he stepped down from the Parish Council. Around the Parish

Seer Green Cricket Team

It is with much sadness that the village cricket team is no longer playing at the recreation ground as they have moved to Coleshill. The team will continue as Jordans Taverners Cricket Club and the Jolly Cricketers will still be their pub, so they will still be the local cricket team.

Green Meadow Youth Shelter

Unfortunately the Youth Shelter has been attracting continued disturbing anti-social behaviour and littering. The Parish Council are looking into options of removing the shelter, with the possibility of it being used elsewhere in the village. Antisocial Behaviour

We have received some grant funding for CCTV at the recreation ground, which we will match fund, to try and help tackle this problem.

Telephone Boxes

British Telecom are removing any unused telephone boxes in the region which includes the two telephone boxes in Seer Green, neither of which has been used in the last 12 months.



Dog Fouling

Once again we return to the issue that causes Seer Green residents a lot of upset and annoyance. If you have a dog please be responsible and clean up after your pet, disposing of bags in the bins provided, not throwing them into hedgerows or hanging them on trees!

Longbottom Lane Road Surface

We continue to put pressure on Transport for Bucks to deal with the potholes and road failure.

National Grid ZL Overhead Line Refurbishment

National Grid plan to undertake essential maintenance work on the overhead electricity line and pylons running through Seer Green between July and October 2017. The works will not affect local electricity supplies however there may be some closure of the footpaths that run underneath. For further information contact 0330 0130 818.

Who to call?

The Parish Council is often approached by residents when issues and problems arise in and around the village. Generally we are either able to deal with these directly, if the issue is under our control, or to help get matters sorted out by liaising with the appropriate local authority or utility, when we have no powers to deal with the issue ourselves. However it can be helpful if residents themselves report particular problems directly to the responsible agency as it can save time. If a number of residents report the same issue, then that can help prioritise any work required.
