PAVILION REFURBISHMENT

Over the past three months the pavilion's sports facilities have been totally refurbished. A new, larger shower room was installed in August. The previous shower area was closed in 2003 as it was in a poor state of repair. This new shower facility was requested by the adult football club since their promotion to the High Wycombe Sunday League, which requires the home team to offer shower facilities to all players.

In addition, both the home and away team changing rooms were redecorated by volunteers from the football team and the Jordans Taverners Cricket Club who use the recreation ground as their home ground.

Grateful thanks go to Dave Anderson, Lewis Payne, Chris Edridge and Gavin Lyons, who gave up their free time to carry out this redecoration.

All the woodwork including the benches were sanded and re-varnished by local craftsmen from the village and the floor was replaced by a new non-slip vinyl surface.

The Parish Council was able to provide the majority of the funding through long term planning for the project and the Seer Green adult football club provided a generous donation through their fundraising.



SEER GREEN UNITED - NEW SEASON, NEW BEGINNINGS

A lot has happened at Seer Green United over the last few months. We have a new chairman and secretary, and best of all we are back playing at the recreation ground.

GREEN WOOD AND THE CEMETERY

The Chiltern Woodlands Project officer visited Green Wood (which is owned and managed by the Parish Council) in August to provide recommendations for woodland management. The ancient wood covers about 3.5 acres and is quite varied in the species it contains, which include maturing oak, wild cherry, old coppiced ash, birch, hazel, field maple, rowan, hawthorns and yew.


The report concludes that some of the oak and cherry have been defoliated by insects this year but it is hoped they will recover next year. Other trees, notably some birch and cherry, may have been affected by the spring drought. It was noted that the holly understorey is becoming very invasive and areas should be cleared regularly to let light in to benefit the ground flora. The officer recommends a 50% removal of these smaller trees over the next two to three years together with the removal of all laurel bushes for the same reason.

Please note that some work will be carried out this winter and footpaths may be temporarily closed for safety reasons.

The Parish Council has been a burial authority since 1938 with the first burials taking place in the cemetery in 1940. Green Wood was purchased by the Parish Council from the DuPre estate expressly for the purpose of providing a burial ground in the village since there was no further space in the Holy Trinity Churchyard.

There have been two applications to extend the cemetery into the woodland, one in 1989 and the second in 1991 (to extend by another 0.25 acres).

Both were refused by Chiltern District Council. The second application went to appeal and was also dismissed by the Department of the Environment. The cemetery is now over three quarters full and space is at a premium as there are no further plans to extend the cemetery. At the July Parish Council meeting it was agreed to re-landscape some areas to provide more burial plots. It was agreed to remove the raised flower bed at the rear of the cemetery, to demolish the rear wall and to remove paving slabs at the rear of the oak tree. The area cleared by this work will be used to provide full burial plots.

In 2008 the Parish Council took the decision to stop the pre-purchase of graves and these can now only be purchased at time of death. Also new graves (both cremation and full plots) are only available to Seer Green residents in order to ensure that sufficient burial space is available for many more years. CHAIRMAN'S COMMUNITY AWARD

Last year the Parish Council introduced an annual award to recognise the person nominated by residents, and judged by the Chairman, to have made the most significant contribution to the village. SEER GREEN WAR MEMORIAL

One of the ideas from the survey carried out by Holy Trinity Church and Seer Green Baptist Church in 2007 was to have an outside war memorial in the village, something that Revd Gaenor Hockey and Revd Richard Palmer had already considered. A more recent village survey also gave a general sense of support. At the last AGM at Holy Trinity, Parish Councillor Dennis Scourfield undertook to investigate further and, following a number of recent meetings and discussions, this brief report gives an update on the position.

Both granite and wood have been considered for the design. One suggestion is a wooden memorial designed and made by local craftsmen in the shape of a cherry tree for which the village is well known. While perhaps not quite as robust as granite or stone, similar crafted wooden memorials both locally and in the city are still going strong after many decades of exposure.

The suggested location, subject to planning permission and local council agreement, is in front of the cemetery on School Lane. Any memorial service could take place within the cemetery area. The memorial would be owned by the Parish Council who would also take responsibility for maintenance. It is hoped that the Parish Council will fund well over 50% of the cost

with other donations from the churches and individuals.

It is planned that the Memorial will be in situ by 2014 to commemorate the centenary of the beginning of the First World War. The names to be remembered would be taken from plaques which already exist in the churches and the Jubilee Hall, and will be circulated in this and other village publications before being finalised.

The Parish Council continues to work on a number of initiatives to increase safety and improve facilities around the village. Please find an update on village activities below...

Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS)

The issues of excessive speed and inconsiderate parking in the village, especially near the school, remain a major source of concern to local residents. The Parish Council continues to press for improvements in 'traffic management' and through funding secured from Bucks County Council (BCC) we are pleased to report that the Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) on School Lane is now installed and operational. An application for funding for a further VAS on Chalfont Road has recently been submitted.

Since we took over and staffed the Seer Green Jubilee Hall Committee we have adopted the SGPC accounting, budgeting and project planning procedures. We continue to work closely with the School and Nursery to ensure that the Hall meets their operational and health and safety requirements. A new Management Agreement has been put in place with the landlords, Bucks County Council.

We have carried out a number of improvements to the Hall's equipment, machinery and electrical systems and its decoration and appearance. Discussions are taking place with BCC to refurbish the toilet blocks. Our website has been redesigned and the booking system improved.

We record our thanks to Jerry Maddox, previous Committee Chair, for his patient instruction and assistance throughout this first year.

We look forward, as funds permit, to making further improvements and working with local clubs, institutions and villagers to ensure the future of this important village amenity.
