BEST KEPT VILLAGE

Seer Green has once again entered the Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village Competition for the first time since 2017.

Marking is based on the provision, maintenance, and overall appearance of:

- 1. Cemetery, graveyard (separate or attached to a place of worship).
- 2. Green, playing field, children's play area, outdoor recreation facilities, designated nature conservation area.
- 3. Floral Displays (hanging baskets, tubs, planters, flower beds etc.).
- 4. Community facilities (Village Hall, Community Centre, Church Hall).
- 5. General environmental features (hedges, verges, ditches, etc.).
- 6. Shops and pubs
- 7. Bus stops, bus shelters, public seating, dog bins, notice boards, information signs.
- 8. War memorial.
- 9. Evidence of community engagement (e.g. website, newsletter, magazine, posters and general community involvement in the Competition)

Please keep your front gardens tidy and even the pavements in front of your homes if you can.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our litter pickers who are regularly out keeping the village clean, some are doing it as part of their Duke of Edinburgh award. We appreciate the difference that you all make to our community.



VILLAGE FACILITIES SURVEY 2024

A big thank you to all the respondents to this survey, which was carried out in September/October last year. Your views are really important in helping the Parish Council shape the priorities for some of the key assets in the village, specifically Green Meadow and the Recreation Ground.

Whilst there were no great surprises and no overwhelming majority views for specific actions that emerged from the survey, there were some key themes. Although additional benches and picnic tables at the Recreation Ground received numerous mentions, the principal concern appears to be the provision of facilities and equipment for older children at both the Recreation Ground and Green Meadow.

YOUTH INPUT NEEDED! To further define that requirement, the Parish Council want to understand the views of young people in the village (aged 7-17). If you have a young person in that age group, we would be grateful if you would ask them to take the online survey by scanning the QR code or using the URL https://www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/JRB8K4/. However, be aware that those attending Seer Green Church of England School will take the survey at school.



The survey results for biodiversity and specifically wildflowers were a little confusing and require further research, whilst general suggestions for enhancements related principally to matters outside the control of the Parish Council, such as traffic management, potholes and pavements. The Parish Council and especially the Parish Clerk, Liz Bates, spend considerable time and effort lobbying and chasing on your behalf on these matters and will continue to do so.

Councillor Hungin presented the award to him surrounded by cheering Scouts and leaders, affirming the huge respect and appreciation many have for him. A very deserving recipient and Seer Green is the richer for his work in our community.

HIGHWAYS ISSUES

There are several highways issues which continue to be a concern to residents.

Speeding

Speeding in the village has been a concern and the Parish Council has installed a new Mobile Speed Indicating Device (MSID) on School Lane. This installation of this new device, which shows your speed in green if under the limit and red if over the limit, has seen a measurable reduction in speeding in this area. Vehicle speed data from the previous sign and the new sign has been collected and analysed and the percentage of vehicles speeding has reduced from over 30% to under 25%. Whilst this might seem to be a small reduction, considering there are approximately 50,000 vehicles per month passing the sign, it represents thousands more cars per year now driving at or below the speed limit. The data also shows the fastest speeds recorded and unfortunately one driver decided that it was ok to drive along School Lane at over 65 mph at 9:44 in the morning!

The old MVAS sign has been redeployed onto Longbottom Lane where it continues to help drivers be aware of their speed in that 40mph zone.

Inconsiderate parking.

Whilst the new yellow lines have made a big difference to dangerous parking in the village, especially on the Chalfont Road bend, issues remain, particularly around the school at drop off and collection times. It is sad that some people still believe that parking illegally doesn't apply to them. Police enforcement of these lines has been carried out and will continue to ensure that our children can arrive at and leave school safely.

Please remember that the way we use the roads in our village both when driving and when parked impacts our neighbours. Please drive and park responsibly and with consideration for others.

Potholes

This is probably the number one issue and repair of these is the responsibility of Buckinghamshire Council. Please remember to report potholes via Fix My Street.

COMMUNITY BOARD GRANT SUCCESS

Each year we have a professional inspection carried out on the equipment at Green Meadow and the Recreation Ground. Highlighted on the report was an increasing need to replace the surfacing under the roundabout, birds nest swings and junior swings in Green Meadow. Ensuring our play areas are safe is important but safety surfacing comes at a high price, in the region of £12 000 for

these four areas. We are delighted to have been awarded a grant from our local Community Board of nearly £7500 towards this project, for which we are very grateful.

The Parish Council will fund the additional cost to enable the work to take place, hopefully before the summer holidays.
